



Tamás Nyirkos is an associate professor at the Institute of International Studies and Political Science, Pázmány Péter Catholic University, Hungary. He holds an MA in philosophy (2007) and a PhD in moral and political philosophy (2011) from Eötvös Loránd University, Budapest. He also has a certificate in religious violence studies from Central European University (2015). Since 2012, he has taught both undergraduate and graduate classes in political philosophy, European political thought, religion and politics, revolutionary movements, and postmodern politics. Apart from PPCU, he has been a visiting lecturer at the University of Debrecen (2012), the Catholic University of Portugal (2014), the Babes-Bolyai University in Cluj-Napoca (2015), and the University of Lapland in Rovaniemi (2015). In 2013, he was also a visiting scholar at the University of Notre Dame, USA. His research interests include Catholic political thought, the intellectual history of the French counterrevolution, political theologies, and theories of democracy. He is a member of the Public Board of the Hungarian Academy of Sciences, and Research Committee 43 (Religion and Politics) of the International Political Science Association. He has published two books: *The Five-Headed Eagle: Theology and Politics in the French Counterrevolution* (2014) and *An Introduction to the End of Times: The Historical Mystique of the Abbot Joachim* (2015).
